

You're a Fashion Designer, am I correct? Do you have a name for your work?

How long have you been designing?

I've been cross-stitching since I was in 3rd grade. In middle school I started hand-sewing and reconstructed a lot of my clothes because my mom didn't like fashion and it was hard for me to buy fashionforward pieces. My junior year in high school was when I bought my first sewing machine and I've been experimenting since then. I did take a beginning sewing class about 2 summers ago, but because it was a summer class it went by fast. We learned the basics of the machine and basic stitches. I wasn't serious and didn't start designing until last semester, about 3 months ago.

Can you cut and sew, as well?

Yes, I can cut and sew.

What is your specialty?

I love making skirts, but I am still in the process of discovering my specialty.

What inspired you to get into fashion designing?

My family and my Hmong culture are my true motivation and inspiration when creating my clothes.

How would you define your style of fashion?

Jules, I love your work, especially the Jumpsuit you designed and posted on Facebook. How long does it take to put a line together? What thoughts run through your mind when you're getting your line done? (Deadlines, nervousness, etc...)

Awww, thank you! If I know what I want to make it doesn't take me long. For my past show at Sac State I made 3 full garments in one night that took about 10-12 hours. If I have all the material and designs ready I can probably put out a 10 piece collection in one week. The beginning is always the hardest for me. Thinking of my designs always takes a lot longer, it's just like writing my introduction for an essay. I can't and hate forcing designs. I like it more when they come to me.

How do you feel when your clothes hit the runway and the models are strutting your stuff?

The first time my clothes hit the runway I was super excited, happy, stoked, and belief. It's a great feeling and a different type of high. I just can't believe it's my clothes that they are wearing.

Do you consider yourself an artist?

Yes, I consider myself an artist.

How do you feel about fashion being art?

I love fashion as art because art is creating something. Self expression through art is amazing.

The Gas Crew's albums coming out soon, and we probably going to have a little DVD to accompany that.


Any shout outs?
































Hey hey! How are you

What's good in Israel?

You're asking the wrong person. I don't want to be here.

I read that you started your flickr account off as joke. What's up with that?

It wasn't a joke, it was more like I didn't know what I was doing. I started the stream out of boredom. I didn't know anything about photography. I only saw pictures I liked, and didn't know why I liked them or what made them good, so I stuck around and learned a lot about both Photoshop and photography. Maybe that is funny, I don't know.

How did you teach yourself photography?

I taught myself by taking pics. Taking pictures everyday teaches you something in the end.

...and Photoshop?

Photoshop I taught myself as well, although I don't think you can ever fully master it. I find it fun to use and not that hard to learn. I also tried some graphic design courses, but they didn't teach me much about Photoshop, so I took advice from else-

where and created nonstop pictures to see what I could do.

What cameras do you use?

I have a Nikon D90 now but I have used many different cameras since I started.

How often do you shoot?

I shoot almost every day. It used to be hundreds daily, but now I have less time. Every photo you see here can take from one hour to two days.

What do you get out of taking pictures?

When I am creating a shot, I put everything into the movement or pose I am making. I can shoot the same pic over and over until I get what I want, so for me it's a time for self-expression. I must do it or I will go nuts.

How much planning do you put into each individual shot?

It depends. I can be very impulsive and just try stuff. I don't plan much of anything in my life; I just go with the flow.

I also read that some instructors of yours were less than positive in regards to your work. Do you think that negativity helped to motivate you as an artist?

Yeah,

they told me that what I wanted to do wasn't art, it was bullshit for the poor or something like that. A few weeks after I started I realized that what I needed was a camera. I was so bored with the letters, logos and adverts that I started to explore with the camera and taught myself Photoshop so I could create a combination of what I liked from what I was learning, and what I wanted to do.

Your work portrays a dark, gritty, almost grungy world. Is this portrayal the way you see the world in which we live?

I see it the way I live; it's the only way I know.

Do you have any photo exhibitions planned for the future?

There are some things I am planning but I don't like talking about it until it's real.

What is the best compliment you've received from your work?

I don't know it's hard to choose just one. I like to make people feel with my work so I guess the best compliment is "you make me feel this moment you captured here." If I make you feel something my work

is



The worst...I get more bad compliments about who I am as person than on the pics.

What impact would you like your photography to make on your audience?

On others? I don't care what the impact is as long they feel the pic. If they like it, fine; if they are repulsed, that's also fine, as long they feel something.

What's next?

I don't know. I don't know what is going to happen next week, how can I think about the future?

And the question I'm not supposed to ask... Why do you shoot pictures of yourself?

I prefer to express myself with my body more than using other models, and besides, it's the most fun when I do them myself since I put everything into creating these pictures. I do create other kinds of pictures, but since I don't really consider them art yet, you won't see them in my galleries.

How did you get started in photography?

My earliest memory of using a camera is around 8 years old. Growing up, my dad was in the photography business, so film cameras were available to me. Because it was a hassle to get prints made, I was hesitant to take photos of things I knew I could revisit and was always trying to capture things that weren't so everyday and average. Doing that helped strengthen my memory and sense of surroundings, allowing me to be able to capture unique things. Digital photography was something I was into when I was younger. I had access to editing software and was always manipulating found images or photos I had taken but the quality of digital was really bad in comparison to what is available now. ital SLR and am pleased with what it has to offer me on such a consistent basis.

Why shoot graffiti?

It is something I have a lot of respect for and is one of the only things in this world that still excites me. Seeing spots that I had never imagined being buffed disappearing, I would always say to myself "why didn't I photograph that?" Even weeks later, I would feel devastated knowing that it was gone, forever. Dealing with that type of emotion was hard for me to grasp. Death was the only thing I could relate it to. But seeing writers still getting up, sometimes in an even better spot, that perseverance gave me hope and would surpass my sadness. It made me look up to these guys on a much more personal level. Exploring the city and following writers in my head expanded my perception of my surroundings as well as my knowledge. Photography empowered me to start documenting as much of my surroundings as I could. Whether it is how it relates to its space or environment, the amount of space it takes up,

or the material it is on; it's those unique pieces I strive to find. By mixing the use of documentation and adding a distinct perspective, I am hoping to expose more people to graffiti through photograph. In general, I feel like it's something I need to document.

How often do you get a chance to shoot?

Surprisingly not that often, so when I do, I try to capture as much as I can. I try to make trips every few weeks back to New York but my connects down there have been busy the last couple months. But there are plenty of photographers there so I am not too worried. I'm hoping to make it more of a regular thing though.

To Photoshop or not... That is the question?

I certainly do, but not on a regular basis. I have been using it for years, so I am familiar with what it has to offer. A camera can limit what I am experiencing while in my surroundings, so being able to compile images into a complete composition is something I do and I won't have to regret. Also things don't always go as planned or just

impossible to view without being obstructed. These are things I try to be aware of while photographing so if I do have to use Photoshop, it is as minimal as possible.

How do you feel when you know that you just captured a great shot?

It excites me. It adds to the drive that keeps me wanting to explore and finding things to photograph. But soon after, it fades away because certain things you can only see once and then it becomes ordinary. It all depends on what I am photographing. There are some shots that bring back specific memories for me and cannot for someone else.

It can be frustrating because I would love to be able to share it with other people but nothing can beat having that memory in my brain.

I do some digital work and also mixed media paintings. I am also interested with early 20th century America.

It's not a good way to live. If you are personally restricting your life; stop. The wider your perspective on life, the better. But I suppose people like that are here






























Hey Drew! What's going

Any shout outs?



The Nifty Fifty






How I Got Over
