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













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The tag line was "Time for a swift exit?"

Sadly the latter, I guess. Why oh why do all those in the advertising and media game think that both tattooists and therefore tattooed individuals are not only a bit thick (i.e. the obvious 'typo' mistake depicted in the advert) but also unable to do or expect a professional job?

The more I thought about it, the more it made my blood boil with the apparent flippancy of the ad company to say that all those that are in the tattooing industry are that flaky; that not only would they be remiss enough to tattoo a design wrongly in the first place, but that they are also so lacking in morals that they would do the tattoo, take the money and run?

we? Say the advert depicted a surgeon with a person on the operating table; green sterile cloths covering most of the body except for a square patch of skin where the operation has taken place instruments and bloody swabs littered about the place. You look closer and you can see the obvious shape of a small kidney dish left under the poor person's skin, where the hapless surgeon had accidentally sewn the article into the patient.

Would the company still run the same tag line or indeed entertain this notion at all? Let's face it, many of us have heard of the odd case where people have spent months, even years walking around with various surgical implements inside them; it does happen - mercifully on very few occasions - and likewise, the odd tattooist can make a mistake so neither side is blameless.

So would my new version of the advert go to print? I think not.

Why do we have to constantly justify our actions and choices to the uneducated?

I presume it's because those in the medical profession are seen as good, clean, upstanding members of the community and tattooists aren't. Has the tattoo industry ever produced a Crippen or a Shipman? (Okay, maybe it has, but they haven't been caught so far) Yet more proof tattooists aren't stupid!

I'm not trying to have a go at the medical profession as they do an incredible job of looking after the sick and needy.

It's just if these ad people gave tattooists the respect they deserve maybe the stigma of tattooists and tattoos might improve in the eyes of the uneducated. We in the industry have the greatest of respect for the guys and girls that pick up a machine and permanently mark others with their stunning artwork.

I get tired of seeing tattooing picked on. It's like seeing a loved one coming under attack by bullies & ne'er-do-wells powered by ignorance. The biggest ignorance is the damage they do to an age-old profession and the disrespect they show to people who decide to get inked.

Maybe I'm am getting too worked up by this off the cuff advert and should dismiss it and just take it as the usual 'oh let's make a mockery

of out of tattooing as it is obviously a shady business' but in this day and age of supposedly enlightened times, can we not open a magazine or newspaper and see something that actually celebrates this wonderful, artistic and passionate industry that we all love?

One day, maybe...

similar to any views I would have myself on the situation.

I was shocked to see you write that anyone with enough cash to setup a studio and show it's clean can start tattooing on the public, now that I think about it, it makes sense but when reading your article the reality of the situation settled in my thoughts. and I thought "this is why there are so many poor quality tattoo's around today".

I understand fully that some artists feel the industry can be self-regulating. And I believe it can, but I feel this self-regulation can only really apply to artists already established and respected. These new Yah-hoo's setting up shops left right and center I don't feel personally that they deserve to be included in a self-regulation category. With my personal view on tattoo's, I feel that if someone wants a piece of tribal, that's fine, no problem, just go to a half decent artist that can give you something more than the tribal that any other man or woman has on the street. I appreciate that some people do like to follow the crowds and do want a piece of generic tribal because they want to be the same as others. But even these people if maybe they were not so naive to a well done tattoo, then they would look into the artist they want to do their piece and choose the appropriate artist.

If there was some regulation to be integrated (like you suggest) I think this could be nothing but a benefit to the industry and would help future bodies from getting poor tattoo's they are bound to regret. I would like to set up some sort of petition or possibly a Facebook group to gain awareness to this matter. I wanted to get in touch with you to get your opinion, if it would be worth the hassle? With being the editor of the biggest tattoo based magazine in the UK I value your ideas.


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TATTOO ARTS FESTIVA

Arrival

Hunkered down low over its rims, due to the weight of equipment and many wares to be sold, the little black car slowly started its journey. This particular Sunday morning was crisp, clear and bright, giving the occupants of the little black car a feeling of mutual anticipation, of excitement and optimism.

he driver sat still behind his dark aviator glasses, passing occasional comments whilst lightly drumming his fingers on the steering wheel. The sun shone brightly through the windscreen, bathing the occupants in the greenhouse warmth of its rays, recharging and awakening them, for they had lost an hour's sleep through no fault of their own. The tyres ate up the few short miles to their destination deep in the heart of County Durham and in no time at all they disembarked from the little black car, safely delivered at the doors of the Peterlee tattoo convention.

The Peterlee Tattoo Arts Festival is a show which over the past few years has become my first show of a busy convention calendar and I always make the effort, whether I am working or not, to go along and see what's what. As I am based in the North East, Peterlee is a great show to discover hidden gems from my local area. Towards the back of the last tattoo year I tend to get spoiled rotten by shows like Tattoo Jam and London, with their wealth of National and International dermal wizardry. My last show of 2009 was Coventry and I mentioned about the importance of grassroots shows and





how they are the main proving grounds for up and coming artists, and Peterlee falls neatly into this category, as well as being an established show with a good reputation and attendance record. This year the 8th Peterlee show was no

exception with a good line up of artists and a bustling crowd spilling into both rooms as soon as the doors were opened. Compared to previous years there was a renewed atmosphere about the 2010 show, probably down to the fact spring was in the air and there seemed to be a feeling that this year was going to be different. With a wealth of convention stalwarts like Bob Hoyle, Rob Doubtfire, Carl 'Cooky' Cooke, Gary Wiedenhof and Ryan Davies working, this year's show were lesser-known artists like Mark from Marked for Life, Ronnie Goddard from Blood Sweat and Pain, Red from Dark Circle and John Anderton from Nemesis Tattoo. This wealth of lesser-known artists was a comfort as they all are from the surrounding Peterlee area and this restores my faith that the level of quality tattoo artists in the Northeast is finally growing stronger and more varied.


I was slightly worried though, albeit the weather was bright and sunny it was bitingly cold and windy and the leisure centre creaked and moaned as little drafts whipped through its halls and corridors. The Peterlee Tattoo Arts Festival is a show which over the past few years has become my first show of a busy convention calendar and I always make the effort, whether I am working or not, to go along and see what's what.

Due to the drop in temperature, a lot of folk were wrapped up and not displaying much inky goodness. Finally I got the ball rolling and by some miracle people started shedding clothing and I was immersed into a colourful sea of fine art work. At certain points of the day, I didn't know whom to ask to photograph next, which is always great but very frustrating at the same time! At least all this running around meant I was in the main convention hall a lot and was able to keep tabs on some particularly fine artwork in progress. Yet not in there long enough to get annoyed with the volume of the music (my only moan!)

Throughout the day we where treated to some entertainment in the form of solo singer Shannon who belted out a lot of classic rock covers which was cool. Keeping the outside queue amused in the early afternoon was a stilt walking fire eater who also performed a sideshow act that I sadly missed, but I heard 3



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was rather good. And to round off the day we had the band, The Arrival.

Whilst on my travels I was fortunate to catch a glimpse of the man and mighty fine side boards of John Anderton. This guy won the Best Newcomer Award at last year's Peterlee show, and it's no surprises why. He was working on a 'flamingo eating brains' piece (it's the only way to describe it!), which was so bright and bold it was literally jumping out of the skin. With tight lines and delicate but simple layout, this piece just worked perfectly. I love tattoos which make you smile through humour, and this one was subtle, but it had me smiling a lot whilst photographing it.

Another guy's work who I became rather interested in over the course of the day was Mark from Marked for Life. I had a lot of his work through the studio and I was rather impressed. Again a good colour artist whose work is completely removed from the colour work of John Anderton, Mark uses muted colour, which adds a certain feel to his tattoos, regardless of subject matter, which compliments his roots within painting. I get the impression that Mark tries to bend his arm to many styles of tattooing, whilst adding in his own little touches, for example some of the work I saw by Mark included, a huge Tibetan Skull back





piece, a delicate bird and blossom piece (done on the day) and an amazing back piece in progress of a T-rex, which I am really looking forward to see finished. Not bad considering the guy has only had his shop open just over a year!


The photography studio was constantly abuzz with people and I had a great time photographing all the work, here are some highlights of work photographed on the day.

Andrew by Ronnie Goddard; I watched this black and grey piece progress throughout the day, and I was very

a very delicate use of tonal shade which in my eyes works really well.

Ceri by Adi; over the past few months I have started to become interested in traditional Owl tattoos, I love this piece on Ceri. Combining traditional lines, tone and colour, Adi has added in a lovely shaded rose in bright pink on a smooth blue background, another good piece and another cracking artist out of Thou Art in Sheffield.

Kirsty by Red; this was Red's first convention outing alongside mentor; Mel, and she has defiantly hit the ground running with some of her tattoos. Staying with Dark Circle, Damen by Mel, this Child clown by Mel's own admission isn't in his typical style, but he has nailed

piece, ok I am a Tim Burton fan but hey, sue me! I love this tattoo of the Corpse Bride and it really captures the essence of the film, let there be more awesome Tim Burton inspired tattoos!

As the buzz of machines slowly died off with only a couple of hardcore tattooists working away finishing off pieces, the presentations of awards was all that was left before the mass pack up and a few cheeky drinks to top off a hard days work. This year's Peterlee show for me was a really good way to kick off my tattoo year, with a lot of tattoo fans and newbie's alike enjoying the relaxed atmosphere of the show and credit must be given to Eddie, Trudy and their team for providing a well organised and well run convention. I like this show and in the short time I have worked for Skin Deep, it keeps getting better and better. Roll on the 9th Peterlee Tattoo Arts Festival!

AN ARTIST ON A ROAD

CLAIRE REID

I literally stumbled on Claire's work some time ago on the internet and from the first moment of seeing her incredible colour-work, there was something in her tattoos that I had seen before but I just couldn't put my finger on it.

As you can see by the photos on these pages, she has a very unique style unmatched by any other artist. Eventually after talking to Claire she mentioned that she had shown me her portfolio a few years previous. Was this fate that we should meet again via her artwork? I think so.





y job is to bring you, the reader, the best tattoos from around the globe and with Claire's amazing almost Mucha-esque tattoos, interspersed with colour of such softness and vivacity, I feel my work here is done.

Claire is one of those lucky tattooists who not only has an obvious talent for tattooing and painting but has an unquenchable thirst for travel and, as such is never in one place for long, choosing to constantly be on the road; meeting and experiencing other artists along her road less travelled.

WHERE AND WHEN DID THE TATTOO BUG BITE?

I think my interest in tattooing was ignited from the age of 16 when I used to hang out at Quiggins in Liverpool. Quiggins was a funky underground four-story building full of retro second hand, moth eaten shops, with tattooing and piercing on the top floor, all the Goths used to hang out there. Ever since I can remember I've always painted and drawn, and was naturally attracted to the imagery used in tattooing from the first time I saw it.

I went to university in 2001 to study sociology and completed the degree in 2004, my main passion has always been the arts, so when I left university I opened a contemporary

art gallery selling glass, ceramics and paintings in order to study on the side as an artist. I ran the shop for a while but was working 24/7 and not practicing as an artist or breaking more than even financially. A week after I closed the gallery I got a job that I LOVED piercing in Luton market. I continued to pierce for about eighteen months after that, this also re-ignited my love for tattooing that had somehow been forgotten after three years of university.

In 2005 I nagged and nagged my boss to let me learn tattooing, but she didn't think that my

drawings were good enough and only gave in after another employee got sacked. She gave me six weeks to learn to tattoo and would make me go back to piercing if I couldn't do it in that time. So I worked my ass off, tattooing and practicing as much as I could under the wing of another tattoo artist, who emigrated, so after the six week apprenticeship I was full time in the studio from there on. I moved to a studio in Peterborough soon after and really loved my time there, but was still working

alone most of the week and had no one to bounce things off, I didn't really have a clue what I was doing!

HOW DID YOU FOLLOW UP YOUR INTEREST IN TATTOOING?

I had two apprenticeships but I consider the time I spent with Paolo Acuna in Phoenix Arizona to be the most influential. When I started my apprenticeship with Paolo I had to start tattooing again from scratch. I stopped









tattooing and began scrubbing tubes, making needles, answering the phone etc, this really helped me kick all the bad habits I'd picked up from my first eighteen months of tattooing. The best thing about working under Paolo was that he had very high expectations and pushed me extremely hard. I'm very grateful to have had the experience of studying with Paolo, not only because I was exposed to his technique as a tattoo artist but also his artistic vision as a fine artist and sculptor. I feel really lucky to have had that opportunity and believe that an apprenticeship was, for me, the best way to learn.

YOU TRAVEL EXTENSIVELY; HAVE YOU WORKED ANY TATTOO CONVENTIONS AS WELL AS VISITING AND WORKING IN MANY FOREIGN STUDIOS?

I got the opportunity to start doing conventions

with Paolo in 2007, and from this, all the doors started to open. For the last three years I have been invited to do guest spots around the world, this came from meeting other tattoo artists at conventions.

I've had really good feedback at the conventions I've worked. I've always been drawn to the painterly and more realistic aspects of tattooing and people seem drawn to that in my work.

Conventions are a great place to learn, there's such a concentration of artists and there are so many different approaches to the art, there's always something to learn from everybody. I love to sit and watch other tattoo artist's at work too, this is also why I love doing guest spots and picking up tips along the way from all the great artists that I've had the opportunity to work with.











DO YOU FIND EXPLORING THE WORLD VIA YOUR ART AND TATTOOS HAS INFLUENCED YOU IN ANY WAY?

I've been working and travelling all over the world for the last three years and have been exposed to many different cultures and practices. Recently I was in Indonesia, it's one of the richest places for art, and everything in the society is infused with amazing exotic imagery. Everywhere I looked there was something to draw from.

For any kind of art I believe travel and exposure to other cultures is essential to acquire a rich and varied source of inspiration. I find that from all of my travels my styles and technique are greatly affected. I sketch most days and I really see the influence of where I am on these sketches. In hindsight, I've noticed that subconsciously I've picked up imagery from the various places that I have travelled without being aware of it at the time.

I think my other artistic practices affect my tattooing the most. I really notice a lot of my painting technique creeping into my tattoo technique, the way I blend colours or work an

area to get a certain effect is similar to how I would paint the same thing. I used to use a lot of clay when I was at school and I'd love to pick this up again, or sculpture of some sort. I think that this would really help with my understanding of 3D forms and relate well to my other mediums.

I've noticed a big difference in how different countries respond to my tattoos and tattoos in general. Canada, America and South America are really accepting, in Bali people loved my tattoos, and there is a really good scene in Australia. Most Australians are tattooed and are willing to travel long distances to get big pieces done. In Europe I find that in the cities people are fine with tattoos, but sometime in

small towns in say, Italy or Spain I get a few funny looks!

WOULD YOU SAY THAT PAINTING, DRAWING, AND ART IN GENERAL HELPS TO SHAPE A TATTOOIST?

I took art at school until I was eighteen and since then I've been trying to pick things up along the way mainly from other tattoo artists. Paolo Acuna was the one who got me back into painting, saying that it would teach me how to tattoo and help develop my style. I've also picked up tips from Jeff Gogue and have been to a seminar, in Montreal, with Shawn Barber. I think that any kind of art training is beneficial to a tattooist.

My influences change a lot, but at the 3



moment I'm really influenced by impressionist and post-impressionist art. I love Van Gogh and Gauguin, their colours and techniques. There's a lot of tattooists I'm influenced by, at the moment I love large Japanese work and hyper realism.

DO YOU FEEL YOU HAVE DEVELOPED A DISTINCT STYLE OF YOUR OWN?

I love anything organic with a good flow. I don't know how to describe my style and want to stay flexible with where I'm going so am trying to explore as many different approaches as possible. At the moment it's realism, Japanese and painterly techniques and style.

I try to think of the tattoo machine as an extension of the paintbrush, I'd love to achieve

the depth, texture and shadings that are possible with oil paint; I try to aspire to the looseness and fluidity of painting in tattooing.

DO YOU LIKE TO WORK FREEHAND OR PREFER TO WORK WITHIN THE CONFINES OF A STENCIL?

A lot of the work I do is free hand, I find that this enables me to achieve a looser tattoo that fits well to the flow of the body, from here if I'm doing a realistic piece I'll stencil on the subject and then go from my drawn design, I don't do that much prep work, I tend to prefer to develop the piece as I go.

My clients vary a lot in how they want the design to be, sometimes they're very definite and give me little creative space, where as other's tell me to go mad and do what I feel.

I love it that no client is the same and I have such a diverse range of people to work with.

The ultimate tattoo for me to create would be a body suit; I would love to have a project like this. If I were to have this opportunity I would approach it from every angle and use all the various mediums at my disposal to prepare for it. I would use a full sized painting of the piece sketches of the areas, and then tattoo it all out, "balls deep" as my friend would say!

The subject matter would be a whole story, so the tattoo took you on a journey from start to finish, I would have to collaborate and brain storm with the person getting tattooed to finalize this. Technique would involve very large mags and very tight detail to achieve sharp focal points and boundless backgrounds.

TELL US WHAT CLAIRE DOES ON HER TIME OFF ...

I cant relax, I'm a workaholic, when I'm not tattooing I'm painting and when I'm not painting I'm drawing. I love my travelling lifestyle as I have a dual holiday and work life, for example where I'm working at the moment in Australia, the beach is opposite the studio, Tea Tree Lake is down the road and rain forests surround the whole area. I also really love music and try to see live bands whenever possible,


YOU HAVE A GOOD TATTOO COVERAGE; CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT YOUR COLLECTION?

I have a full back by Paolo Acuna, which we started in 2007 and have tattooed it all around America, in Canada, Italy and London. A full leg by Jeff Gogue which has a portrait by Mike Demasi on the inside calf, a portrait by Robert Hernandez and a small one from Lez Barlow and Rico Schinkel. My back and my leg still have a while to go so I'm trying not to get anymore until they're finished.

WHAT DO YOU LIKE ABOUT YOUR CHOSEN CAREER PATH?

I love being an artist; it's all I've ever wanted to be since I was a kid. I get so much out of this because it's my passion, and when you're





that passionate about something, you give it your all. I'm also really lucky in the fact that I can travel so much with my work, the freedom is incredible, I would never have dreamed of being able to work in so many places.

I have so much to learn still, and really want to work on my technique and design, I love that there is no ceiling in tattooing, you can take it as far as you want and even if you get good, there's always a thousand people better than you to learn more from.

WHAT DO YOU FEEL ABOUT THE EVOLUTION OF THE TATTOOING SO FAR?

I've noticed great changes in the time I've been tattooing, people are a lot more educated and go out of their way to research an artist that suits them. They also seem to want bigger work and have more unique ideas, which I love as I've been able to work with some really interesting concepts lately. When I was younger, I only saw flash shops and never got a tattoo as I didn't like anything on the walls and they wouldn't tattoo custom work. It was really limiting, but now the imagination is the only limit!

I'm really excited about where tattooing is going, its amazing what people are creating zzat the moment, it blows my mind every time I see new works from artist's I know and then see incredible work from people I've only just discovered. I can't wait to see what people will be doing in the next ten years if things have come this far in the last ten.

The only thing that worries me is the amount of young girls I've seen with stars, flowers, hearts, diamonds etc tattooed on their faces. I went to some conventions in the UK this year and I was really surprised at how many there were.

WHO WOULD YOU LIKE TO 'BIG UP'?

I have experienced constant help and kindness throughout the time I've been tattooing, all the people I've had the opportunity to work with have helped me so much, and I'm so grateful for their openness and willingness to help answer my questions and let me sit and watch. There's so many people I need to thank, but mainly Paolo Acuna, Mike Demasi, Josh Carlton, Filip Leu, Benjamin Moss, Robert Hernandez, Ethan Morgan, Tim Kern, John Montgomery, Jeff Gogue, Boris, MG Venom Tattoo, Rico Shinkel and Pierre Tattoo Mania.

Meet Peach. This piano-playing Canadian with a lust for wandering, talks about her tattoos, and their connection to her eclectic heritage.

each has plans for more ink and living in Vancouver, she finds that the tattoo scene is strong and vibrant, although the same old stigmas haunt those who work with visible ink and many have to cover up or get frowned upon. When she eventually finishes with her travels, Peach wants to teach piano and I'm certain that she will be one of the most colourful piano teachers in Canada!

WHERE DID YOU GROW UP AND CAN YOU LIST YOUR INTERESTS AND ASPIRATIONS AS A CHILD.

I grew up in Langley, BC, Canada, which is on the outskirts of Vancouver on the West Coast. It's an all right place until you hit high school age and then realise there's nothing to do. Quite like most cities. As a child I had a few attempts at sport-like activities such as figure skating, swimming and diving lessons and I started taking piano lessons.

WHEN DID YOU INITIALLY BECOME INTERESTED IN TATTOOS, WHAT PROMPTED YOUR INTEREST?

At 14, I started hanging out with some of my sister's punk friends who had a few tattoos. They were all pretty rad people, so I'd have to say that was what sparked my initial interest.

TELL US ABOUT YOUR FIRST TATTOO AND EXPLAIN HOW THE WORK HAS PROGRESSED SINCE THEN.

My first tattoo was eagerly anticipated, and I got it a few days after my 18th



birthday, which is when you no longer need parental consent in Canada. I actually found this random drawing in a science fiction magazine in art class. I'd cut it out about 2 years earlier and held on to it ever since, so I knew that I wanted it for sure. It says FANTASY when you look at it upright and upside down it says REALITY.

TALK THROUGH EACH OF YOUR CURRENT TATTOOS AND TELL US SOMETHING ABOUT THE ARTIST WHO DID YOUR WORK.

This is going to be a long answer! I'll work my way up from the foot. On my right foot I've got a peach, which is my nickname from when I was 14. On the left foot, which is the most recent one, there's a locked treasure chest with a skull and some bones lying around it in sand. Above that I've got a ghost ship. To the left of that is a piece of sheet music going down my calf. On the back of the other leg, and one of my only colour tattoos, is a heart with some

and shrubbery around with a shed and a bike leaning on it! Absolutely love it. On my back I've got 36 stars, started as 26, going from the top of my butt up to my shoulder, this was my second tattoo.

There's a huge beautiful angel, next to that named Lenore, holding on to a rose. A treble clef is on the direct back of my neck. Behind my ear is a purple bow on one side and the other a diamond. My friend Coburn, back in Langley, who has his own studio called Black Widow Ink did this one and the music notes on my leg. First two were done at Lady Luck, also in Langley where everyone was partial to, but I didn't find that these were done very well, I think the needle was too deep and there's a bit of scar tissue. Everything else was done by Aaron at Bodycraft in Nottingham, unfortunately he's just moved to Indiana, so won't be getting anything more until he comes back to visit Ireland, in the fall. He's definitely the man to do the rest of my work, really lucky that I

Norwegian flowers going through it, which I found when travelling to where my grandfather was raised. Upper thighs I've got a raven on the right and a dove holding some purple flowers on the left. On my hipbone I've got the fantasy/reality one and then the same thing flipped over saying reality/fantasy on the other side. Going up either side the rib cage reading downwards is lyrics by The Doors, "When the music's over" and "Angels Dance & Angels Die." The backs of my lower forearms are two of the artist Banksy's balloon girls, one on each side. Upper arm is a haunted house scene with the whole gateway, complete with an owl in trees with hidden faces in by a full moon. On the inside of that is an epitaph styled headstone covered in ivy which reads, "As it was in the beginning, so shall it be in the end" Lyrics from One Love by Bob Marley. It's not in a religious context I just like how it can be interpreted in several ways. The other half sleeve is a windmill scene, kind of like you'd find on a plate that says Holland on the bottom. Just like a sketch out of an art book, a bridge with reflection in water

managed to find him by fluke when I wanted a few more stars added to what I already had and worked from there!

IS THERE ANY PARTICULAR THEME THAT RUNS THROUGH THE DESIGNS THAT YOU HAVE CHOSEN?

Only really the fact that I'm quite keen on taking Aaron's input on what he thinks would suit the sort of style that we've got going on. Usually I just make a suggestion and he adds his own personal touch to it, such as a little pirate on the ship reaching for a bird, or a cat on the pathway to the haunted house. Also the fact that damn near all of it is just blacks and shading. Adds to the authenticity of it

DO YOUR TATTOOS HAVE ANY SPECIFIC SIGNIFICANCE OR MERELY AESTHETIC.

Like previously mentioned with the flowers were from Karmoy, Norway where my grandfather was raised. The windmill is because my other grandparents were born in Holland and I get an awesome vibe when I've visited there, it's just a nice, hip place to be. Other than that, mostly





aesthetic, though they all give me some sort of significance in their own way but to go in to all of it would just take up a lot more to talk about!

WHAT IS IT ABOUT TATTOOS THAT SPECIFICALLY APPEAL TO YOU?

I love the artistic merit, sort of just feeling like a human canvas. I enjoy being able to display work that I'm proud of having. Not a very extensive answer on that one.

HOW DOES THE TATTOO SCENE IN CANADA DIFFER FROM THE UK? HOW ARE HEAVILY TATTOOED WOMEN PERCEIVED? ARE VISIBLE TATTOOS A PROBLEM IN EMPLOYMENT?

It depends on if you're in a major city for sure, tattoos on women are quite popular and trendy at the minute in Vancouver, it's hard to not find someone without them these days. I'd say it's probably pretty similar in the UK, always depends on what sorts of crowds you hang out with too. I think

it's a good thing though, aside from the fact that, dependant on what job you have, it's quite frowned upon still to have tattoos in employment. Unless you work at a pub or music shop you're generally going to have to cover up.

WHAT PLANS DO YOU HAVE FOR FUTURE IN REGARDS TO TATTOOS AND WITHIN ASPECTS OF MY LIFE?

My plans for future career-wise are actually to become a piano teacher and teach students from my own home. I've been taking lessons on and off for about 12 years but travelling tends to get in the way with getting



it fully on the go. So once I finish this spurt I'll buckle down and finish up my exams and then get 'er done.

ASIDE FROM TATTOOS ANY OTHER INTERESTS OR HOBBIES?

Mostly pastimes, aside from piano and travelling, would definitely have to be art, films, music, gigs, photography, stand up comedy and just chilling out with friends, having a drink or camping. I also enjoy taking a stroll just for the sake of wandering to learn about my environments.


ANYTHING ELSE YOU'D LIKE TO SAY?

I'm really quite interested in doing modelling for promo work and anything else tattoo related. 

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he tattoo bug bit Grisha when he was only 16 and since then he has developed and collaborated with various other artists to enhance his unique style of tattooing. Grisha has worked in different countries, picking up influences from places such as Sweden, Germany, Norway and Yugoslavia gaining a large client base, all wanting a piece of "Maslov Magic". Welcome to the truly unique world of Grisha Maslov - Tattoo Master...

I HAVE NOTICED THAT SOMETIMES THE COLOUR OF YOUR ARTWORK COINCIDES WITH THE CLOTHES OF YOUR CLIENTS. IS IT THE FORTUITY, BECAUSE I HAVE PAID ATTENTION TO THIS, LOOKING ON THE PHOTOS OF YOUR NEW TATTOOS DONE RECENTLY? DO YOU CHOOSE A TATTOO FOR THE CLIENT LOOKING ON HIS CHARACTER AND PECULIARITY?

Probably it is not a fortuity. I like coloured tattoos, one of my preferences is to stick to natural, skin-like colours; I love the tints of orange, brown, sometimes red. I usually reserve the choice of colours for the client.

If he or she specifies certain colours, I don't contest their decision. I try not to use more then 3 colours in one tattoo; mixing them with each other, I also use white quite a lot. Matching of individual pictures as a rule, I try to match the design to the energy of the client, in his art preference and lastly to enhance the bodyshape of the person. The images appear suddenly from my communication and discussions of different topics with the client. We talk about tattoos, about life, about their loves. I want to know about the individual more, to see and guess about the creating the perfect image for them. The final outcome of the tattoo and the happiness of the person are paramount to me.

I HEARD YOU ARE INTERESTED IN POLITICS. WHICH PARTY ARE YOU A MEMBER OF? CAN YOU TELL US OF THIS PARTY? OR DO YOU THINK THAT IN POLITICS IT'S POSSIBLE TO DO SOMETHING FOR TATTOO-ART AND TATTOO-MASTERS AT THE SAME TIME?

To take an interest in politics is necessary I feel because politics will take interest in you some

day in the future. I'm the member of the party "Unitary Russia"; the party helps me to make contact with wholesome people in Moscow, the structure of the party works very well. But I will be honest, I'm interested in tattoo-politics most of all and I spend most of my time on it, being the leader of the public organization called; "The Club of Tattooed People". The word "politics" means to help and direct those in the organisation to progress as artists.

FROM WHAT DO YOU TAKE YOUR UNIQUE STYLE? WHERE IS THE BEGINNING OF YOUR STYLE AND FROM WHAT DO YOU TAKE THE INSPIRATION?


Inspiration can be taken from anywhere, from a visiting exhibition with beautiful girls, from architecture, design, photographic sources, sculpture, natural beauty; the list is endless. My style has been created over the years, firstly through my tattoo experiences and art preferences. Also, I was lucky that in the beginning of my career I met a young and assiduous painter, Ivan Aladishkin. I began to

order pictures on his given subject matter and we started trading work for work and began discussing pro's and con's of art, and we found that we share similar experiences.

My style I'm calling "tattoo-innormizm", which means word for word, diverse normality, and style born purely from many transformations from have been already.

YOUR TATTOOS ARE VERY SIMILAR IN STYLE, AND THEY SHOW THE UNIQUE WORLD OF SHAPES LIVING BY THEIR OWN LIFE. EVEN IN THE MOST ABSTRACT COMPOSITIONS IT IS AN ATMOSPHERE OF DIFFERENT ATTITUDES TOWARDS OBJECTS AND ANATOMIC PLACEMENT OF ELEMENTS. DOES YOUR ARTWORK CARRY ANY INFORMATION, IDEA?

The basic idea of my style – it's multiformity; I like to use the free space around tattoos (my works are without background) using them as an integral part of composition, stirring up different associations in the mind. The works from one point of view are quite simple, which I feel anyone can do, but from the other side,





they are containing many different and hidden meanings. For example, my new tattoo with blue lines on the girl's leg is just a fish, but if you take a good look at each part separately, you can see an owl, and faces of flipped personas, even those three burs with dots under the knee are also the images of three children.

TELL ME ABOUT YOUR CREATIVE DEVELOPMENT, HOW HAD YOU COME TO THIS? TELL ME ABOUT HOW YOU BEGAN TO MAKE TATTOOS.

I think I began to make tattoos out of curiosity really. My friends did tattoos on themselves in neighbouring areas. My first tattoo experience was on myself, after one of my friends from my neighbourhood encouraged me to do this, and at the time I was upset, that I couldn't make tattoos of good quality, so after that, I began to look for a teacher. Roger, a tattoo-master, well known in our city, at that time was the best tattooist and painter, but denied me any training. But then I found in a neighbouring village, a carbon-black tattoo-master; Ephrem and he agreed to teach me. The payment was a bottle of Samogon (Russian moonshine vodka), and that day we started the teaching process. We met many times and he lectured me a lot, he explained how to interpret meanings of tattoos in criminal spheres, where and which tattoos could be done and those that could not, I took in all the

information like a sponge, such was my thirst for knowledge.

For a better understanding of the process of tattooing from my teacher, I gave him a half of my back for his tattoo-art, and to this day I still have these tattoos. After some time I began to work in a beauty salon called "Kleopatra" and there I met and married Kseniya in 2001. Soon after, I went to Germany to work, later I came back and I decided to go to Moscow with my family. It was a very hard time, as Moscow didn't want to accept me, I spent lots of money on advertising and accommodation. I worked in various jobs to try and sustain my family and eventually, I got recognised and slowly I made a living out of tattooing.

In 2003, I moved into a Moscow district called Krasnopresnenskiy, I did many tattoos there and had much money, so life was good.

Eventually, I decided to invest money in technologies, into creating websites, the first personal site I produced was at the beginning of this year and by winter I created others for my friends and colleagues. This was the first interactive portal and I named it "The Club of Tattooed People", Evgeniy ProtoPlex, author of the site, devised the slogan: "Who is without us will be with us soonest". From that moment there were not more then 20 people in the club. In 2004 we created one of the most beautiful




websites about tattoos in collaboration with a Ukraine design-firm. The site was great, the attendance had increased very much and we had one of the highest ratings in world's top flash-sites. And to this date this is still up and running – www.tattoo-world.ru. A crucial point happened in my life and in my artwork in 2005, when I sadly dissolved my marriage with my dear wife but happily I now live to my new sweetheart Evgeniya Vladimirivna, who gave birth to my son. Exactly at that moment I decided to follow my own rules: "Not to do tattoos which I don't like". The financial gain had failed, but my work began to get recognised and this showed off my real individuality, I had chosen a hard way, but for me it is a good way of living.

HOW DO YOU THINK RUSSIAN TATTOOING STANDS UP AGAINST THE BACKGROUND OTHER EUROPEAN AND WORLD STAGES?

I think, on Russian tattooing, there are many good tattoo-masters, but I'm upset, that there are not many who celebrate the Russian traditions, they haven't time to rise up and they are destroyed by foreign trends, and most of tattooed people are with uniform and uninspired tattoos because of their low art-knowledge; demand exceeds supply. Russia is famous by her very elaborate tattoos, may be it's in people's character – to mess with each millimetre of skin – for my opinion it's unjustified.











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


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



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

'Munchen' is a pretty little town with spotlessly clean streets, a healthy selection of bars and restaurants, and lots of interesting sculptures dotted about the pedestrianised areas and parks. It was weird though, walking through these quaint streets and not seeing a single piece of litter, which was very nice but virtually every building had some form of graffiti sprawled on its walls. Some of it was pretty good but the majority was quite poor, but that didn't seem to spoil the town's charm at all. It just made it more colourful.

Back in the hall, things were at a frenetic pace as you would expect a few hours before the doors open at any show, especially an inaugural one.

Andy had decided to open the doors to the public on the Friday afternoon to give folk more time to get work done and no sooner had the doors opened, than tattoos were in the making. As time ticked on and the welcoming speeches were given, in both Germany and English (a nice touch that), the show got underway. Lots of the

booths were already filled with clients beginning their inky weekend. The artists were spread over four rooms

on three floors, with the majority in the main hall on the first floor, where the main stage was also situated. Walking among the booths on the first floor was almost like going to a convention in the US. I walked



past Carlos Torres who was next to Bob Tyrrell who was close to Jo Capobianco and Jime Litwalk. Next to them was John

of the hall was Tony Ciavarro. Whilst the likes of Liorcifer, Ben Moss and Tom Strom were in a smaller room just off the main hall. Upstairs was Mike DeVries and Nick Baxter, the American contigent reminded

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me of what it must have been like back in the early fifties when musicians and singers all went on tour together in a succession of big old greyhound busses, only this time the 'Great American Tattoo Tour' had hit town via the airport.

Andy must have some influence to get such a healthy list of transatlantic artists over considering the difficulties many foreign tattooists are having these days with over zealous customs officials. Not forgetting his own countrymen, Andy had invited a sizeable amount of home grown talent in the shapes of Andy Engel, Tommy Lee Wendtner, Miss Nico from All Style Tattoo, Nine Lives Tattoos and many more; there were close to forty Artists working from Germany and many more from other countries including Holland,

Sweden, France Japan, Italy, Singapore and Russia, with the UK being represented by Bez and Ash.

Later, in the afternoon there was a pin striping exhibition with a scooter and a BMW motorbike getting the paint treatment. This drew a pretty big crowd, as did the many other trade stalls selling jewellery, clothing, magazines, books and gifts. The rooms started to fill up not long after half five. I assume that this was due

with many liking to wear the clothes and listen to the music; but in Germany, it is HUGE. Nine out of ten men walking around the venue either sported a quiff, huge turnups and/or a work shirt; the lady's wore the big multilayered dresses or again, jeans with turnups that you could hide a small child in, and fifties style hairdos. I felt like I had gone back in time a few decades. It was as though the sixties had never happened!

to folk leaving work for the weekend. As the throng of tattoo machines continued, on stage was the, by now, regular art fusion, with three canvases and three artists all sharing the stage to create a collaborative piece of art.

Now I know in the UK there is quite a resurgence of the fifties/rockabilly music and style entering the convention scene

Along with the look was the music. This set the tone for the entire weekend. Rock N Roll and Rockabilly music accompanied the tattooists from the moment the doors opened until they shut late in the evening. I can put up with a bit of both styles of music but after three days I wanted to stick pencils in my ears; even some of the Americans I spoke to said they













loved Johnny Cash but they wouldn't be listening to him for a few months after they got home, such was the overload. This look is massive in Germany with lots of dedicated 50's shows and conventions taking place, there were stalls selling gentleman's pomade (a sort of hair grease), R'n'R memorabilia and all other varieties of 50's merchandise.

As Friday came to an end, several of the big name artists held seminars for those not working the show but wanting to further their careers and techniques. For the rest of us, it was time to head to the bars and restaurants to grab a drink and a meal and reflect on what was a great start to the weekend.

Saturday and the crowd was much bigger than the previous day, this had the effect of increasing the temperature inside and it was nice to head outside every now and then to get some fresh air as the sun shone for what apparently was the first time in months. Although the heat was quite intense inside, many folk chose to keep their coats and jackets on. This made my job pretty hard trying to spot tattoos. Occasionally I would spy a colour tattoo poking out of a work shirt or some black and grey masterpiece tempting me from beneath a cardigan, worn back to front of course, (ala fifties style!).

I did fare much better when it came to the judging. Myself and one of the other photographers (thanks Mick!) from the German tattoo magazine; Tattoowier, cleared some space stage right and we herded the contestants over, after they had been judged, for photographic purposes.

This worked out perfectly and I must say it was really refreshing to see new work from other countries and I breathed a sigh of relief at actually getting some tattoo photos.

As well as the long list of international artists attending, there were many more local tattooists I had not previously heard of so it was good to see work from many of these guys 'up close and personal' so to speak. On the

A chap by the name of Randy from a studio called Heaven of Colours in Austria was producing some amazing colour tattoos. I had seen quite a few tattoos by him earlier whilst on stage during the judging and I was told that he and Boris from Hungary are good friends and you could definitely see the Boris influence in his work. Max 'From Hell' had some great work on show and was hard at work tattooing all weekend; such was the demand for his own style of Black and Grey work.

Talking of styles, there was one booth that had a big crowd around it all weekend. That was the booth of Simone And Volko from Buena Vista Tattoo. These guys have been taking the tattoo world by storm over the past year or so with their very distinctive portraits blended with strong graphical shapes and text, many of which are sat on unusual places on the body. Their work is amazing. It's so good to see a new style emerging in the tattooing industry. Simone and Volko will both be working their first UK show at Tattoo Jam (www.tattoojam.co.uk) in August if you like the look of their work.

Later, we were entertained by some burlesque dancers, then a chap called Ski-King who took to the stage. Intrigued, I stood to see what this rather imposing chap was going to do and judging by the













cheers that went up when he appeared, he was already well known in Germany. The music started and off he went; into a stage act of yep, you guessed it. Fifties covers... This was my queue to hit the bar, but I have to say I hung around for a couple of numbers and his voice was pretty amazing as was his Johnny Cash tribute, which was very impressive. I did like his Elvis meets Motorhead rendition of Ace of Spades too.

That night, the artists were treated to a party laid on by Andy and his team. A large coach took all the attending artists to a barn, apparently in the middle of nowhere that was decked out with sand, surfboards, hoola girls and flower garlands, a proper luau by all accounts. I sadly missed out on what was a superb night with the last coach coming home at six in the morning.

On Sunday there were a few sore heads and some very delicate tattooists heading over from the hotel not three hundred yards from the venue. As the doors opened for the day, a few booths were unoccupied as I think a few of the harder partygoers had a bit of a lie in. It might be a good idea too put the party on the Sunday night after the show?

Again the rooms all filled up pretty quickly and those artists whose eyes had re-focused started the day's proceedings. Again the work heading up on stage for the competitions was immense with all genres of tattooing on show.

Sunday seemed a little quieter compared to the UK shows, where it is usually the busier day but it was never quiet and ninety nine percent of tattooists were working and those that weren't had decided not to by choice I think.

Just prior to the winding up of the show we were treated to a superb display of Dancing through the ages by a couple. Starting with a Charleston demonstration, then they dashed off behind a screen to reappear in WWII uniforms to do the jive, then off again to come back and dance some Rock and Roll. This was really good and considering both were well into their fifties, they put on a superb act and the audience loved it.

As the weekend drew to its final

conclusion, Andy handed out the awards that were hand made, painted surf boards to both artists and tattooees and the crowds started to wander off and the Kaiser Friedrich Hall began to empty.

THE RESERVE AND ADDRESS.

The only fly in the ointment for me over the weekend was the rudeness and bullishness of one Tattoo Scout/ Sprit magazine. When I mentioned their behaviour to others, they did not seem surprised, confirming this fitted with their understanding of the magazine's ethos. They decided to start filming artists in the one and only corridor to one of the tattoo rooms and when we and others decided to try and get to this room we were shouted at and told to leave the area. This denied access to many who wanted to get into the room housing the other artists. Not a nice way of treating their potential customers I feel. It was small and minor transgression, though but one I feel needed mentioning all the same.

I have driven through Germany on many occasions but never had the chance to stop but I am so glad I came over for the first Ink Explosion. It was a superb weekend. Chatting after the show with some of the artists, not one had a negative thing to say about the show and many were really looking forward to and some having already booked tattoos for next year.


AND DESCRIPTION OF THE PERSONS ASSESSMENT

I would like to thank Andy and his team for all their help and over the weekend.



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



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

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respected and influential tattooist worldwide, Mosher has a tonne of other art-projects going on, from books & clothing-lines to tattoosupplies & seminars, just to name a few. I was lucky enough to meet Mosher at the Dublin Tattoo-Convention 2009. We got talking and when he invited me to Michigan for a visit, I didn't hesitate. Intrigued by Mosher's extraordinary work, his somewhat withdrawn and humble persona, I prepared for my visit with excitement.

On Kalamazoo's busiest street, S. Westnedge Avenue is where you'll find Body Armor Tattoo. The shop was opened by Mosher in 1996

Mosher employs three highly skilled tattooists, a piercer, as well as an apprentice.

"We stay open until 9 pm everyday and if we all stayed tattooing until midnight, we'd still have to turn away business" - says Mosher as we enter his shop.

"I would do that, but I have other projects I'm working on" - he adds.

80's rock is blaring from the computer behind the front-desk, every wall-space is

filled with Flash, artwork & Mosher's photos from his travels all around the world - it's 1pm and opening time, the state-of-the-art studio is already filling up with customers. "The majority are walk-ins Mosher explains, people here don't book appointments, they want their

tattoo on the spot." The place is buzzing, the vibe is up-beat and I'm filled with an instant happiness as I'm welcomed as a long lost family-member by Mosher's crew: Breanne, Danny, Earl, Kyle and Skot.

Although the tone amongst the crew is laidback and fun and jokes aren't scarce, it's obvious how much they all respect and look up to Jack.

WHAT'S THE COMPETITION LIKE IN THIS TOWN?

"There are about ten tattoo-studios in Kalamazoo and probably just as many in Grand Rapids, about 40 min. north of here. The reason we're so busy. I think, is that we're so




well-rounded here, we can do anything! We all have our preferences of course - Danny enjoys doing just about anything, Earl favours old-school, colour-work and animals, Kyle's into Japanese-style tattoos as am I and Breanne, my apprentice loves vibrant organic art as well as realism. At the end of the day, Body Armor is a business - you do what you have to do." "It's through all my other art-projects I get to unfold myself artistically. That's what I really

want to talk about" - says Mosher as he sits down free-handing a "Mosher-special" tribaldesign on a clients shoulder.

When I meet Mosher at his house the following day, he's outside shovelling snow wearing a kimono with a samurai-sword tucked in at the front - true Japanese-style. Having seen him wearing a similar out-fit at the Dublin-Convention I just have to ask;

WHY ARE YOU WEARING A KIMONO?

"I always dress like this at home, at conventions too and sometimes even at the shop. When wearing a Kimono you have to



sit, stand, walk, and move in a certain way. which makes you think differently. Wearing this outfit helps me draw better because I think and move like the characters I'm drawing. It has helped me to better understand the time-period of the stories behind my artwork. At this point I don't really need to dress like this, I've just gotten used to it, I like it, it's comfortable and it helps me embody the spirit of the characters I draw.



INTRODUCING THE BODY ARMOR CREW...

EARL FREDERICK CRONKRIGHT A.K.A "SILVERFOX"

The 44 year-old with an Associate's Degree from Delta College and a Bachelors of Fine Art from W.M.U, grew up in the same town as Mosher and has known him for 25 years. Earl was apprenticed by Jack and has worked at Body Armor for 13 years.

"My ambition is to keep pushing my art to higher levels. Jack has always been a great mentor with his dedication to his craft and attention to detail, he truly is an inspiration. I'm also inspired by Salvador Dali and everything around me. I love tattooing Old-school, New-school, Colour-work, Realism and Animals.



WHEN DID JAPANESE ART AND HISTORY START INTERESTING YOU?

"I've been intrigued by Japanese art as far back as I can remember, but the first 5-6 years of my career I worked in "street-shops" and did all sorts of designs. It all kicked off when






SKOT MCKIBBIN

YOU ALSO GO BY THE NAME "HORIMOUJA", WHAT DOES IT MEAN AND WHAT'S THE STORY BEHIND THE NAME?

"It's a bit tricky to explain, "Hori" is the title, "mouja" the name. It means fierce person, Monster, wild man.... there's just not one word that can describe the meaning of the name. The Japanese have a hard time pronouncing Mosher and always says "mouja-san". My Japanese friends Horimitsu sensei and Shimada-san gave me "Horimouja" as my

name and title. I was honoured and because of my extensive background in the martial arts the name is perfect for me."

CAN YOU TELL ME ABOUT THE HIGHLIGHT OF YOUR CAREER AND THE BIGGEST DISAPPOINTMENT?

The highlight was the day I got my first email from an artist who bought my first book. He told me my book was a great inspiration to him. I felt at that point that I had found what I was meant to do - to inspire others. Whether it be in art or as a human, if I can help someone be better than me then that is a great honour. "The greatest disappointment, without a

doubt, is all the illegal copies of my books. People buying them knowing they're illegal and contribute to ripping me off. As the small community we are, we have to look out for each other."

YOU HAVE ACHIEVED SO MUCH AND HAVE A LOT GOING ON, DO YOU HAVE ANY FURTHER AMBITIONS?

"I would like to have more books drawn and published than any other artist in the world! It's a tall order, but it's my goal and to me as a human being and an artist it's the way to improve and move forward."



This 40-year old man works more and harder than anyone I've ever met and he still looks 10 years his junior. Me on the other hand, after a week in the "Body Armor-Family", I need a holiday! In the meantime - Jack Mosher is still pushing himself to higher levels; he still has more to offer!

So to all of us Tattoo-enthusiasts, fans and fellow-tattooists; we've by far seen the last of the amazing artist Jack "Horimouja" Mosher.

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
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capital of the 1920's is today characterised by its dazzling modernity and breathtaking architecture. No other landmark symbolises German history better than Berlin's signature attraction, the Brandenburg Gate. When the Berlin wall fell in 1989, thousands of East and West Germans celebrated the opening of the borders and re-unification of Germany. The Brandenburg gate has a magical appeal for all visitors to Berlin, from heads-of-state to tourists. Berlin is dynamic, cosmopolitan and creative, allowing for every kind of lifestyle.

This year, Frank Weber, manager of B52 tattoo, organised the event at Arena Berlin, after the convention outgrew its previous venues. Arena Berlin easily housed all 160 working artists, along with the many visitors who attended.

Tattoos are not a product of the modern era. The art of marking the skin goes back centuries, with tattooing in the Western world having its origins in Polynesia. After the discovery of 'tatau' by eighteenth century explorers Bougainville and Cook, this Polynesian tradition became popular

amongst European soldiers, who brought the practice back to Western society.

Tattooing has been in practice since Neolithic times. Otzi the iceman is the oldest human to be found with markings on his skin that appear to be medicinal in purpose. Nowadays, tattoos can be an expression of individuality, personality, or a rite of passage. Many famous people wear tattoos, such as Madonna, Bon Jovi and Robbie Williams.

First considered exclusively as a way of showing membership in a social group, tattoos, and techniques, have evolved over

Today's tattoo machines move a solid needle up and down to puncture the skin between 50 and 3,000 times per minute.

the last few decades. This is, in part, due to the changing fashions of the rock, hippy, and punk movements.

The word tattooing comes from the Samoan "tatu" meaning "to strike" as this was part of their technique. Multiple assistants manually stretch the skin taut. The tattooist then uses two tools, one being a bone tipped rake and the other the striking stick. The rake is dipped in

ink then struck with the other stick to puncture the skin. The traditional tattoo stands at the show attracted many a curious spectator.

Today's tattoo machines move a solid needle up and down to puncture the skin between 50 and 3,000 times per minute. The needle penetrates the skin by about a millimeter, and deposits a drop of insoluble ink into the skin with each puncture.




















those done with a modern machine. He specialises in Oriental art with elements of realism.
